## Industrial visit for FDDI, Chhindwara Campus students at Raymond Life Style Ltd.

A group of thirty-five students, accompanied by their faculty members—Dr. Agya Preet,

Mr. Ashish Sharma, HR Manager, provided a comprehensive overview of the textile manufacturing process, starting from fiber preparation to yarn production, spinning, and the subsequent stages of textile manufacturing.

The students were briefed on the sequence of operations, and a step-by-step demonstration was conducted on the shop floor. The batch toured various sub-departments, including Spinning, Dyeing, Weaving, Finishing, and Final Quality Control, gaining hands-on insights into each stage of textile production.

## Industrial exposure for FDDI, Chennai students

To provide a strong foundation and enhance the practical knowledge of its students, FDDI Chennai organized an industrial visit for 110 Foundation Programme students on 17<sup>th</sup> March 2025.

Under the guidance of senior faculty from the School of Footwear Design & Production (FDP) and the School of Fashion Design (FD), the students visited Balamurugan Leathers, The General & Industrial Leathers (P) Ltd. in Chromepet, and the Ananafit Natural Fiber Cluster in Anagabuthur, Chennai.

Balamurugan Leathers specializes in producing shoe uppers, suede leathers, and garments for export to France, Vietnam, and Cambodia, while The General & Industrial Leathers (P) Ltd. manufactures cow upper leathers, cow splits, and buff leathers for the footwear and leather goods industries.

During the visit, students were briefed on the complete leather processing workflow, including leather curing with salts, pre-tanning operations, soaking, liming, de-liming, pickling, chrome tanning of buff and goat leather, post-tanning processes, and various quality checkpoints. They also observed leather bundling and packaging, water treatment for hazardous tanning residues, and the technology used in footwear design up to the final assembling process.

Ananafit specializes in weaving textiles using traditional loom producing customized sarees and dhotis and supplying to state government handloom department and also to the local shops.

This experience complemented their theoretical learning in the subject of Leather Technology, enhancing their overall comprehension of industrial practices.

Students observed the transformation of raw hides into finished leather and participated in live demonstrations on dyeing and grading.

## **Educational excursion for FDDI, Hyderabad students at Pochampally Handloom cluster**









## Book – co-authored by Faculty, FDDI - Hyderabad published







## **Opinion of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India on the Accounts of Footwear Design & Development Institute for the year ended 31 March 2025**

### **Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of Footwear Design & Development Institute (FDDI), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31 March 2025, the Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 23(2) of the Footwear Design and Development Institute Act, 2017. These financial statements include the accounts of 12 Campuses of FDDI at Ankaleshwar, Banur (Chandigarh), Chennai, Chhindwara, Fursatganj, Guna, Hyderabad Jodhpur, Kolkata, Noida, Patna and Rohtak.

This Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards, disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions regarding compliance with the Law, Rules and Regulations (Propriety & Regularity) and efficiency cum performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through inspection reports/ CAG's audit reports separately.

In our opinion the accompanying financial statements of Footwear Design & Development Institute, read together with the accounting policies and Notes thereon and matters mentioned in the Separate Audit Report, which follows, **give a true and fair view** of the financial position of the autonomous body as at March 31, 2025, and its financial performance and its cash flow for the year then ended in accordance with Uniform Format of Accounts for Central Autonomous Bodies, prescribed by the Ministry of Finance.

### **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with the CAG's auditing regulations/standards/manuals/guidelines/guidance-notes/orders/circulars etc. Our responsibilities are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the autonomous body in accordance with ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.


### **Responsibilities of Management for the financial statements**

**Separate Audit Report on the Accounts of Footwear Design & Development Institute for the year ended 31 March 2025.**

**A. Balance sheet**

**A.1 Current liabilities and Provisions (Schedule-7): ₹56.52 crore**

**A.1.1 Other Administrative Expenses (Schedule-21): ₹34.36 crore**

(i) A reference is invited to the Comment No. A.1 on the financial statements of Footwear Design & Development Institute (FDDI) for the year 2023-24, wherein non-provision of ₹12.45 crore on account of lease rent along with compound interest thereon demanded by the Noida Authority, was highlighted.

FDDI requested (25 February 2025) the Noida Authority to recalculate the Interest payable on the basis of Simple Interest rather than Compound Interest or to waive the interest. The Noida Authority after accepting the request of FDDI, recalculated the interest and finally raised (29 May 2025) a demand of ₹ 4.45 crore<sup>1</sup>. However, the outstanding demand was not provided for in the books of accounts as on 31 March 2025, and it was disclosed only as a contingent liability.

Non-provisioning of outstanding demand of Noida Authority resulted in understatement of Current Liabilities and Provisions, understatement of Other Administrative Expenses and consequent understatement of Deficit by ₹4.45 crore. Consequently, the Corpus/Capital Fund was overstated by the same amount.

Despite raising the issue in Separate Audit Report of previous year (2023-24), no corrective action has been taken by the FDDI Management.

(ii) The above does not include provision amounting to ₹24.30 lakh towards Lease Rent payable in respect of FDDI Guna Campus at Madhya Pradesh.

FDDI requested (14 February 2025) the District Collector, Guna for intimating the amount of Lease Rent payable for the period 2020 to 2025. O/o the District Collector intimated (20 February 2025) an amount of ₹29.16 lakh (at the rate of ₹4.86 lakh per year) and asked FDDI to deposit the aforesaid amount. Though FDDI made (29 March 2025) the payment of ₹4.86 lakh, no provision for the balance amount i.e. ₹24.30 lakh was made in the books of accounts as on 31 March 2025.

Non-provisioning of outstanding demand of lease rent resulted in understatement of Current Liabilities and Provisions, understatement of Other Administrative Expenses and consequent understatement of Deficit by ₹24.30 lakh. Consequently, the Corpus/Capital Fund was overstated by the same amount.

(iii) The above does also not include an amount of ₹2.82 lakh payable in respect of lead acid batteries purchased by FDDI (Patna Campus). FDDI received the consignment and invoice dated 25 March 2025 on 1 April 2025. Accordingly, necessary liabilities should have been provided for in the books of accounts as on 31 March 2025.

Non-provisioning for the liability towards purchase of lead acid batteries resulted in understatement of Current Liabilities and Provisions, understatement of Other Administrative Expenses and consequent understatement of Deficit by ₹2.82 lakh. Consequently, the Corpus/Capital Fund was overstated by the same amount.

## **B. General**

### **B.1 Contingent liabilities and Notes to accounts (Schedule-26)** **Capital Commitments - Nil**

(i) FDDI awarded (September 2023) contracts for construction and development of ITC Lab Building at Noida (Uttar Pradesh) for ₹27.56 crore and for Girls hostel at Banur Campus (Karnataka) for ₹15.84 crore. The contracts included various works *viz.* Civil, Electrical, Plumbing, Firefighting, Supply of Equipment, Consultancy charges, etc. FDDI had incurred an amount of ₹13.70 crore (₹8.95 crore for Lab Building *plus* ₹4.75 crore for Girls hostel). It was, however, observed that FDDI did not disclose the balance Capital Commitments of ₹29.70 crore (₹43.40 crore *minus* ₹13.70 crore) in the books of accounts as on 31 March 2025.

This resulted in deficient disclosures to that extent, besides non-compliance with the requirements of Accounting Standard-10 (Property Plant and Equipment).

(ii) A recovery suit had been filed against FDDI for ₹2.14 lakh along with pendente lite and future interest at the rate of 18 *per cent* per annum from the date of filing the suit till its realisation. This was not disclosed in the accounts.

Despite raising the issue in Separate Audit Report of previous year (2023-24) vide comment no. B, no corrective action has been taken by the FDDI Management.

## **C. Management Letter**

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Separate Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Management through a Management Letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

## **D. Assessment of Internal controls**

### **(i) Adequacy of Internal control system**

No Management Information System (MIS) exists for monitoring assets, expenditure and resources, leading to weak monitoring. FDDI has not insured its assets such as land, buildings, and equipment, exposing it to financial risks from fire, theft, accidents, or natural calamities.

### **(ii) Adequacy of Internal Audit system**

Internal Audit was being done by hired Chartered Accountants' firm namely M/s Sanjay Monika and Associates and the same had been completed up to the financial year 2024-25 for all the campuses.

### **(iii) System of Physical verification of Fixed Assets**

Physical verification of the Fixed Assets for the year 2024-25 was carried out, except at Chennai, Guna and Jodhpur campuses, which was not in compliance with the requirements of

Chapter 9 of the Finance and Accounts Manual of FDDI, which provided that as per GFR 213 (1), Institute shall carry out physical verification of assets annually by a committee formed by HO and ED for the respective campuses. Further, physical verification at Rohtak campus was in progress till the conclusion of audit.

Further, fixed assets amounting to ₹28.90 lakh were transferred by FDDI Head Office to Patna Campus. Though, the assets transferred by the Head Office have been incorporated in the financial statements of the Patna Campus, the same are not available at the FDDI Patna Campus. The issue is pending since July 2021.

**(iv) System of Physical verification of Inventory**

Physical verification of Inventory in FDDI was carried out during FY 2024-25.

**(v) Regularity in payment of statutory dues:**

The Institute was regular in payment of statutory dues during the year 2024-25.

**E. Grants in aid**

FDDI had an opening balance of Grant amounting to ₹14.11 crore as on 1 April 2024. It received grant of ₹9.513 crore (Non-leather Project) from the Government of India during the year 2024-25. Out of the total grant, FDDI utilised an amount of ₹23.466 crore. The closing balance of Grant as on 31 March 2025 was ₹0.157 crore.

Besides, FDDI earned interest of ₹0.296 crore on the grants and refunded interest of ₹0.285 crore during the year.

**Schedule-25: Significant Accounting Policies**

**25.1 Accounting Convention:**

The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention, unless otherwise stated and on the accrual method of accounting.

**25.2 Valuation of Inventories**

Store, spare & consumable (including machinery spares) and stationery items are valued at cost.

**25.3 Revenue Recognition**

All the Income & Expenditure are accounted for on accrual basis except Grant/Subsidy, which was shown as part of Income to the extent of depreciation charged to the Asset purchased out of the Govt Grant.

**25.4 Recognition of Grants**

Government Grant/Subsidy related to depreciable fixed assets are treated as Deferred Income. The Deferred Income is recognized in Income & Expenditure Accounts on systematic and rational basis over the periods and in proportions in which depreciation on related asset is charged.

**25.5 Investment**

Both long-term and short-term investments are valued at cost as on the date of Balance sheet 31<sup>st</sup>-March-2025.

**25.6 Fixed Assets and Depreciation**

- (i) Fixed Assets are stated at their original cost including freight, duties, customs and other incidental expenses relating to acquisition and installation less accumulated depreciation.
- (ii) Depreciation has been charged on WDV method as per the rates prescribed under the Income Tax Act-1961.
- (iii) The depreciation is charged at 100% of rate prescribed if an asset is acquired on or before 30th September and 50% of rate prescribed if assets are acquired after 30th September at the rates specified in Income Tax Act'1961.
- (iv) No depreciation has been provided on the capital expenditure incurred during the year relating to the capital work in progress since they were not capitalized till the date of Balance sheet.

**25.7 Employee's Retirement Benefits and Others Benefits**

The provision for leave encashment and Gratuity has been made as per the actuarial valuation done by registered valuer. A Group Gratuity policy for all the FDDI campuses including Head Office have been taken from LIC.

**Schedule: 26 Contingent Liabilities and Notes to Accounts**

**26.1 Contingent Liabilities:**Claims against the entity not acknowledged as debts

a) The Noida Authority has issued a letter dated 24-01-2024 demanding Rs 12.45 Crore (approx.) as arrears of interest on account of delayed payment of Lease rent. Subsequently vide a letter dated 26-09-2024, Noida authority informed that aforesaid overdue interest liability is increased to Rs. 14.14 Crores. Based on representation(s) made by FDDI, vide letter dated 29-05-2025, Noida authority after recalculating the interest, reduced the demand to Rs. 4.45 Crores. The matter is still being taken up with the Noida Authority for further waiver/reduction of Interest.

**26.2 Current Assets, Loans and Advances:**

In the opinion of the Management, the Current Assets, Loans and Advances have a value on realization in the ordinary course of business, at least equal the amount at which they are stated in the Balance Sheet as on that date.

**26.4 Grant in Aid**

During the current year FDDI received Grants from central government to the tune of Rs.9,51,28,954/- for Non leather and earned Interest Income on the grant of Rs. 29,69,506/- (Non-Leather Rs.2,06,407/-, Banur Girls hostel Rs.9,84,316/-, Noida New Lab Building Rs.16,60,497/-, CNC Project Rs.1,18,286/-). Out of this amount aggregating to Rs. 28,51,220/- was refunded to DPIIT. The grant utilized/adjusted against depreciation on Asset purchased out of the Grant Rs 60,57,95,218/- and Non-Capital expenditure/Recurring Expenses of Rs. 29,09,856/-

**26.5** The Institute has capitalized grant Rs. 1600.08 lakhs during the current financial year 2024-25 in comparison to the previous financial year 2023-24 Rs. 2669.31 lakhs out of fund provided by the Government.

**26.6 Capital Work in Progress**

During the year Rs.15,01,82,482/- is shown as Capital Work in Progress towards the expenditure incurred for setting up of FDDI Bannur Girls Hostel Rs. 4,74,98,106/-, FDDI Noida Lab Building Rs. 8,94,64,959/- and CNC & IDLS-Noida Rs. 1,32,19,417/-.

**26.7 Depreciation:**

The Depreciation has been charged during the current financial year 2024-25 on all the Asset purchased and created out of the Government Grant. The total depreciation charged during the current year on the assets was **Rs.60,57,95,218/-** and the grant was adjusted against the same value as shown in Schedule-13 and Schedule-22. Further the depreciation charged on Asset purchased out of the own fund amounting to **Rs. 2,88,30,791/-** is shown in the Income & Expenditure Account.

**26.8 Disclosure in respect of Land**

The following lands have been allotted free of cost by the respective state governments for the FDDI Campuses and the same have been shown in the books of accounts at a nominal values of Re.1/- each.

#### 26.7 Taxation:-

The Institute has obtained registration under sub clause (i) of clause (ac) of sub-section (1) of section 12A of Income Tax Act 1961, accordingly income of the institute is exempt as per the provisions of the act. Further Institute has incurred losses during the year, therefore, no provision for Income Tax has been considered in the Books of Accounts.

**26.8** The interest income on investment of the earmarked/endowment fund is being credited to the related fund and refunded to the Government.

**26.9** All known and ascertained liabilities, and all income and expenses related to the financial year ended 31st March 2025 have been duly provided/accounted for in the books of accounts as per the accounting policy consistently followed by the Institute.

#### 26.10 Provision for Retirement Benefits

The expenditure booked on account of provision for Leave encasement & Gratuity for the captioned year was Rs.1,59,86,892/- & Rs. 1,39,83,839/- respectively. The total provision for Leave Encashment & Gratuity at the yearend was Rs.7,28,27,098/- and Rs.8,90,05,179/- respectively, out of which sum of Rs.8,01,50,002/- is invested in the LIC Group Gratuity Scheme.

**26.11** As per the Institute's policy, during the year Institute paid LTC (Leave Travel Concession) for the block year (Calendar year) 2023-2024. Total aggregate LTC expenses including provision towards LTC for the period from January-25 to March-2025 was **Rs. 147.95** out of which expenditure **Rs. 107.92** Lacs pertains to LTC for the period from April-2023 to March-2024, which has been shown as 'Prior Period Expenses' under **Schedule-24**.

#### 26.12 Prior Period Income & Expenses:

An accumulated balance **Rs. 376.37** Lacs lying in Student Development Fee which was reflected under current liability in earlier years financial statements and was part of Student Fee has been recorded as income and disclosed as prior period income during the current year under **Schedule-24**. Similarly Prior period expenses **Rs. 124.29** Lacs which include Prior period LTC Expenses as mentioned in the above Note 26.11 is disclosed under **Schedule-24**.

#### 26.13 Provision for doubtful debts

During the current year a provision for doubtful debt aggregating to **Rs. 315.09** Lacs, which includes provision on account of the fee receivable from students **Rs. 149.97** Lacs and **Rs. 165.12** Lacs towards other debts being Lab Charges, which were outstanding for a period of more than 3 years as on balance sheet date.

#### 26.14 Excess/Shortfall of Income over Expenditure

As an organization's policy, the excess of expenditure over Income after considering Prior Period Income/expenditure Rs. 713.75 Lacs has been transferred to Capital/Corpus Fund.

### 26.15 Others

- i. Fixed Assets related to projects of all the campuses are maintained at Head Office, Noida.
- ii. Balance of stock (stores & Consumables) & cash balance have been taken as certified by HODs based on physical verification carried out by them as on 31.03.2025.
- iii. The balance of sundry debtors, creditors, receivable, loans & advances & other liabilities whether in debit or in credit are subject to confirmation and reconciliation.
- iv. There was a system of internal audit in place and books of accounts have been audited by an independent firm of Chartered Accountant.
- v. All the financial figures have been rounded off the nearest rupee while compilation of the financial statements.
- vi. Previous year figures were re-grouped and rearranged whenever it was necessary.

The meeting concluded with a "Vote of Thanks" to the Chair.


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


