



### Master class on 'Digital Design Applications for Sports & Knitted Footwear' held at FDDI, Hyderabad campus





#### Webinar on 'Processing of Non-Leather Materials' held at FDDI, NOIDA campus


A webinar on 'Processing of Non-Leather Materials' was held on 08<sup>th</sup> September 2021 at FDDI, NOIDA campus.

#### Master class on 'Importance of Foot Anatomy on Footwear' held at FDDI, Hyderabad campus



Dr. Pawan Kumar Sadhvani, MBBS, MS (Orthopaedics) from Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences Andhra Pradesh is a qualified fellowship joint replacement specialist from Germany. He has been practicing for more than 13 years as an Orthopedic Surgeon Consultant (Hyderabad Nursing Home and Vijaya hospital and Consultant Arthroplasty (Hospital DU Cinquantenaire, Africa).





Through a presentation, Dr. Pawan provided insight and practical advice related to structure and function of foot, basic parts of foot, classification of foot and foot abnormalities.

The flag hosting ceremony was followed by the National Anthem in all the campuses of FDDI, amid maintaining precautionary measures of COVID-19 pandemic.








#### FDDI, Chhindwara celebrates 'National Handloom Day' with awareness webinar




The webinar was attended by approximately 100 participants including students, faculty members and staff members across 12 campuses of FDDI and from other institutions and industry persons.


By maintaining the precautionary measures of COVID-19 pandemic, the staff members of the institute planted saplings in the campus premises.

The conference included an I m mersion Practice where Ms. Sharma collaborated with her team members and interviewed


entrepreneurs from Tanzania to understand the personal and business challenges faced by them.

The webinar was attended by students, Research scholars, Faculties, Professors, from




various colleges, and industry expertise which helped the participants in acquiring better understanding and developing new approaches to visualize design & portfolio development.





The MoU was exchanged during the 5th session of India-Portugal Joint Economic Commission on 9<sup>th</sup> April 2021, by Mr. Arun Kumar Sinha, IAS, Managing Director, FDDI and Ambassador of Portugal to India, His Excellency Carlos Pereira Marques.

Mr. Hardeep Singh Puri, Hon'ble Minister of State Commerce and Industry, Government of India, co-chaired the 5<sup>th</sup> session India-Portugal Joint Economic Commission, where Ms. Nidhi Mani Tripathi, Joint Secretary (JS), Department of Commerce (DoC), Ministry of Commerce & Industry (MOC&I), Mr. Rajendra Ratnoo, JS, Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT), MOC&I, Mr. Y. P. Dhewal, Deputy Secretary, DoC, MOC&I were also present and extensive discussion on areas of bilateral trade and economic cooperation was held.

CTCP is a non-profit organization founded in 1986 with the incorporation of a footwear quality control laboratory created in 1981. CTCP was created by Component and Leather Goods Manufacturers Association (APICCAPS) and two Governmental Institutes of the Portuguese Ministry of Economy (IAPMEI and INETI).

Its main objectives are to provide technical support to companies in the footwear sector, supporting them in their different activities related to their business strategies.



This MoU will aid in collaboration and partnership between the two institutions in the areas of c on s u l t in g assignments and sectoral studies, industrial trainings, laboratory testing operations, R&D activities as well as capacity building programmes across the countries.

Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India on the Accounts of Footwear Design & Development Institute for the year ended 31 March 2022

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of Footwear Design & Development Institute (FDDI) as on 31 March 2022 and the Income and Expenditure Account and Receipt and Payment Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 23(2) of the Footwear Design & Development Institute Act, 2017. There are a total of 12 campuses of FDDI all over India. All 12 campuses (Patna, Kolkata, Jodhpur, Ankaleshwar, Guna, Chhindwara, Noida, Fursatganj, Rohtak, Chandigarh, Hyderabad and Chennai) prepare their own standalone financial statements which are consolidated by FDDI Noida. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Laws, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
- i) We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purposes of our audit.
- ii) The Balance Sheet and Income & Expenditure Account and Receipt and Payment Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format approved by the Government of India.
- iii) In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by Footwear Design & Development Institute (FDDI), Noida in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
- iv) We further report that:

A.1 Liabilities

A.1.1 Current Liabilities and Provisions (Schedule 7)

Other Current Liabilities: ₹17.86 crore

Others: ₹6.22 crore

1. The above does not include an amount of ₹1.43 crore on account of damages (₹1.35 crore) and interest (₹0.08 crore) on delayed transfer of funds lying in the PF Trust to Employees Provident Fund Organisation.

FDDI received a demand notice dated 24 November 2021 from EPFO for payment of ₹1.35 crore as damages and ₹1.10 crore as interest under Section 14B and Section 7Q respectively of the Employees Provident Fund and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 for belated transfer of funds to EPFO after surrender of PF Trust by FDDI to EPFO. FDDI paid interest amounting to ₹1.02 crore as per its own calculations instead of ₹1.10 crore levied by EPFO. Further, FDDI requested (December 2021) EPFO to waive off the damages of ₹1.35 crore. However, the request was rejected (February 2022) by EPFO stating that the power of waiving off damages was not vested with EPFO but it could be challenged before the Central Government Industrial Tribunal (CGIT). FDDI neither paid the amount of ₹1.35 crore as damages along with balance interest of ₹0.08 crore to EPFO nor provided any liability for the same. Moreover, FDDI also did not prefer any appeal before the Industrial Tribunal in this matter.

This resulted in understatement of Current Liabilities and Provisions and other administrative expenses by ₹1.43 crore and overstatement of Surplus by the same amount.

### A.1.2 Earmarked/ Endowment Fund (Schedule 3) Capital Grant: ₹603.35 crore

The above represents closing balance of Capital Grant received by the Institute from the Government, out of which ₹532.53 crore (₹603.35 crore less ₹70.82 crore being unutilized grant) has been utilized for creation of assets. However, an amount of ₹532.83 crore has been depicted as the Net Block of Fixed Assets created out of Government Grant (Schedule 8B). Thus, a difference of ₹0.30 crore exists between the Capitalized Government Grant and Assets created out of Government Grants as on 31 March 2022 which needs reconciliation.

Despite giving assurance during the previous years, i.e., 2018-19, 2019-20 and 2020-21, the Institute has not yet reconciled the difference between Capitalized Government Grant and Assets created out of Government Grants.

- A.2 Assets
- A.2.1 Fixed Assets from Government Grant (Schedule 8B)
- A.2.1.1 Capital Work in Progress: ₹46.86 crore



1. The above includes an amount of ₹46.09 crore being the construction cost of building (including ₹0.98 crore on account of PMC fee paid) under Centers of Excellence Project in 6 Campuses of FDDI namely Chennai, Kolkata, Patna, Jodhpur, Rohtak and Hyderabad in respect of which the construction work was awarded to JPG Engineers Pvt Ltd on 14 October 2019 and the work was completed before 31 March 2022.

Since the work had been completed and final bills had been submitted before 31 March 2022, the total cost of the work amounting  $\leq 46.46$  crore ( $\leq 45.11$  crore plus PMC fee at the rate of 3 *per cent* thereon i.e.,  $\leq 1.35$  crore) should have been capitalized and added to the building.

Non-capitalization has resulted in understatement of Fixed assets (Building-Schedule 8B) by ₹44.14 crore (net of depreciation of ₹2.32 crore at the rate of 5 per cent on ₹46.46 crore), Current Liabilities & Provisions (Sundry Creditors) by ₹0.37 crore (being amount payable on account of PMC fee) and overstatement of Capital work in progress by ₹46.09 crore. This has also resulted in understatement of depreciation on building (Schedule 8B) by ₹2.32 crore and consequent overstatement of Grant to the same extent.

2. The above does not include an amount of ₹1.64 crore being value of work done by contractor in respect of Air Conditioning works in Centers of Excellence across India before 31 March 2022.

FDDI awarded the contract for 'Supply, Installation, Testing and Commissioning of Air conditioning and associated works in Centers of Excellence at Patna, Hyderabad, Kolkata, Chennai, Jodhpur and Rohtak' to JPG Engineers Pvt Ltd at a cost of ₹2.17 crore on 3 January 2022. Accordingly, JPG Engineers Pvt Ltd, after completion of a certain amount of work, submitted its First Running Account Bill amounting to ₹1.64 crore to FDDI on 28 March 2022. Since the work valuing ₹1.64 crore had been done by the contractor before 31 March 2022, the same should have been added to Capital Work in Progress during the year and liability thereof should also have been recognised.

Non-inclusion of the same has resulted in understatement of Capital Work in Progress and Current Liabilities & Provisions by ₹1.64 crore.

3. The above includes an amount of ₹0.97 crore towards revenue expenditure on purchase of Annual or yearly subscription of Adobe creative cloud and fashion forecast.

During the year 2021-22, FDDI incurred revenue expenditure of ₹0.97 crore out of the grant received for Computer Networking Center (CNC) project for purchase of annual/yearly subscription of Education License for FDDI Campus for ₹0.05 crore, Adobe Creative Cloud for ₹0.68 crore and yearly subscription for Fashion forecast for ₹0.24 crore. However, instead of adjusting it from grant for CNC project, FDDI included the above revenue expenditure of ₹0.97 crore in Capital work in progress under Schedule 8B.

This has resulted in overstatement of Capital Work in Progress by ₹0.97 crore and consequent overstatement of Grant to the same extent.

#### A.2.1 Fixed Assets from Government Grant (Schedule 8B)

#### A.2.1.2 Plant and Machinery (Depreciation): ₹49.90 crore

The above does not include depreciation of ₹2.66 crore on the Fixed Assets of ₹13.29 crore which were put to use for more than 180 days during the financial year 2019-20. FDDI charged depreciation at the rate of 20 per cent instead of 40 per cent considering the period of use as less than 180 days.

This has resulted in overstatement of Fixed Assets and Government Grant by ₹2.66 crore.

The comment was issued in the Separate Audit Reports for the years 2019-20 and 2020-21, but no compliance has been made in respect of charging the depreciation for the year 2019-20.

#### A.2.2 Fixed Assets from Own Funds (Schedule 8A)

#### A.2.2.1 Building: ₹171.16 lakh

The above includes an amount of ₹40.58 lakh (₹45.09 lakh minus depreciation of ₹4.51 lakh at the rate of 10 per cent on ₹45.09 lakh) capitalized during the year being the cost of consultancy works for Banur project. Punjab completed by the consultant M/s Concept Planner International on 10 October 2018.

Since the above work had been completed on 10 October 2018, the same should have been capitalised and added to Buildings during the financial year 2018-19 itself. However, FDDI capitalized the above work during current financial year 2021-22. Further, depreciation for the period October 2018 to March 2021, which works out to ₹11.27 lakh (2018-19: ₹2.25 lakh, 2019-20: ₹4.51 lakh and 2020-21: ₹4.51 lakh) has also not been provided by FDDI.

This has resulted in understatement of depreciation for the previous years (2018-19 to 2020-21) and overstatement of Corpus Fund by ₹11.27 lakh.

#### A.2.2 Fixed Assets from Own Funds (Schedule 8A)

#### A.2.2.2 Plant Machinery and Equipment: ₹296.04 lakh

The above does not include an amount of ₹31.56 lakh (₹34.12 lakh minus depreciation of ₹2.56 lakh at the rate of 15 per cent on ₹34.12 lakh for less than 180 days) being cost of Air Conditioning works in Noida Campus which were completed before 31.03.2022.

FDDI, Noida awarded Air Conditioning works in Noida Campus on 14 October 2021 to JPG Engineers Pvt Ltd with scheduled date of completion on 14 March 2022. The total work valuing ₹129.81 lakh was completed by JPG Engineers Pvt Ltd before scheduled date of completion. As such, the whole amount of ₹129.81 lakh should have been capitalized by FDDI. However, FDDI capitalized ₹95.69 lakh only (₹54.69 lakh under Schedule 8A and ₹41 lakh under Schedule 8B).



This has resulted in understatement of Fixed Assets (Plant Machinery and Equipment – Schedule 8A) by ₹31.56 lakh (net of depreciation of ₹2.56 lakh) and current liabilities by ₹34.12 lakh. This has also resulted in understatement of depreciation by ₹2.56 lakh (at the rate of 15 per cent on ₹34.12 lakh for less than 180 days) and overstatement of surplus carried to Corpus/Capital Fund during the year to the same extent.

#### C.2 Contingent Liabilities and Notes on Account (Schedule 25)

The above does not include the Capital Commitment amount of ₹5.37 crore comprising balance payment of ₹0.53 crore to JPG Engineers Pvt Ltd for Air Conditioning works in Centers of Excellence across India and ₹4.84 crore to Plush interiors Pvt Ltd for work related to Furniture/Interior and Furnishing works in Centers of Excellence.

FDDI entered into a contract for Air Conditioning works in Centers of Excellence across India with JPG Engineers Pvt Ltd for ₹2.17 crore out of which the contractor completed partial work and submitted a bill of ₹1.64 crore to FDDI on 28 March 2022. Similarly, the work related to Furniture/Interior and Furnishing works in Centers of Excellence was awarded to Plush interiors Pvt Ltd on 28 March 2022 for ₹4.84 crore which was remaining to be executed.

Hence, capital commitment of ₹5.37 crore (₹0.53 crore plus ₹4.84 crore) towards balance amount of work to be executed on capital account should have been depicted under Capital Commitments.

#### D. Other Comments

The Institute has not constituted a fund as per the requirement of Section 21(1) of the FDDI Act, 2017 wherein áll moneys provided by the Central Government, all fées and other charges received by the Institute, all moneys received by the Institute by way of loans, grants, gifts, donations, benefactions, bequests or transfers; and all moneys received by the Institute in any other manner or from any other source shall be credited.

Despite being pointed out in Separate Audit Reports for the years 2017-18, 2018-19. 2019-20 and 2020-21, the Institute has not yet taken any action.

#### E. Grant in Aid

As certified by FDDI, it had an unspent balance of Capital Grant of ₹56.90 crore under Centers of Excellence and Computer Networking Center Projects (including ₹0.63 crore of retention money) as on 1 April 2021. The Government of India has given a grant of ₹45.64 crore for Centers of Excellence projects to FDDI during the year 2021-22. Out of the total grant, FDDI utilized an amount of ₹30.57 crore. Further, FDDI earned interest of ₹1.81 crore during the year 2021-22 and refunded interest of ₹2.96 crore. The closing balance as on 31 March 2022 was ₹78.09 crores (including ₹7.27 crore on account of excess balance of payable to contractors/liquidated damages/retention amount/own fund).

Further, it was also observed that FDDI utilized ₹23.11 crore of Capital Grant for Centres for Excellence under Indian Footwear, Leather and Accessories Development Programme (IFLADP). However, FDDI furnished incorrect Utilization Certificates amounting to ₹45.64 crore during the year as against the actual utilization of ₹23.11 crore.

- F. Deficiencies which have not been included in this Separate Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Management of the Institute through a Management Letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.
- v) Subject to the observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.
- vi) In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure, give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India.

#### Annexure to Separate Audit Report

#### 1. Adequacy of Internal Audit System

Internal Audit is being done by hired Chartered Accountants' Firm and the same has been completed up to the financial year 2021-22 for all the campuses except for the Kolkata Campus in respect of the period from 01.04.2021 to 30.09.2021.

#### 2. Adequacy of Internal Control System

The internal control system is inadequate and not commensurate with the size and nature of the activities of FDDI in so far as financial matters are concerned. The procedure for accounting of income, grants, and fixed assets created out of Government Grant and depreciation thereon needs improvement.

#### 3. System of Physical verification of fixed assets

Physical verification of fixed assets has been completed by the Management for all campuses except the Jodhpur campus. No discrepancy was found during the physical verification.

#### 4. System of Physical verification of inventory

Physical verification of the inventory has been completed by the Management for all campuses and no discrepancy was found.

#### 5. Regularity in payment of statutory dues

The institute was regular in payment of statutory dues during the year 2021-22, except the PF dues as pointed out in Comment No. A.1.1 (1) of this Report.

#### Schedule-24: Significant Accounting Policies

#### 1. Basis of preparation of financial statements:

- (a) The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the historical Cost conventions.
- (b) Accounting policies not specifically referred to otherwise are consistent with generally Accepted accounting principles followed by this institute.
- (c) The items of income & expenditure are recognized on accrual basis.

#### 2. Fixed Assets:

- (a) Fixed Assets purchased/created are stated at cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation. The cost of acquisition is inclusive of freight, duties, taxes and other essential expenses.
- (b) Following lands have been allotted free of cost by the respective state govt. and the same have been shown in the Books of Accounts at a nominal value of Re 1/- each.
  - Land for FDDI Branch at Chennai, Tamilnadu
  - Land for FDDI Branch at Kolkata, West Bengal
  - Land for FDDI Branch at Rohtak, Haryana
  - Land for FDDI Branch at Jodhpur, Rajasthan
  - Land for FDDI Branch at Hyderabad
  - Land for FDDI Branch at Patna, Bihar
  - Land for FDDI Branch at Banur, Punjab

#### 3. Depreciation:

The Depreciation has been charged during the current financial year 2021-22 on all the Assets purchased and created out of the Govt. The Total Depreciation charged during the current year on the assets was Rs. 64,11,68,499/- and the grant was adjusted against the same value. Further the depreciation charged on Assets purchased out of the own fund amounting to Rs. 103,68,393/- shown in the Income & Expenditure Account. As per the Policy, no depreciation has been provided on the capital expenditure incurred during the year 2021-22 relating to the capital work in progress since they were not capitalized till the date of Balance Sheet.

#### 4. Investments:

Both long term and Short-term investments are valued at cost as on the date of the Balance Sheet.

#### 5. Inventories:

As certified by the department heads, the inventories are valued at cost.

#### Revenue Recognition:

All the income are accounted for on accrual basis except Grant/subsidy, which was shown as part of income to the extent of depreciation charged to the Assets purchased out of the Govt Grant.

#### 7. Expenditure:

All the expenditure was booked on accrual basis. During the year 2021-22, the expenditure booked on account of provision for Leave encashment of Rs. 34,50,396/. The total provision for Leave Encashment is Rs. 6,55,89,671/- and provision for Gratuity is Rs.8,44,46,210/- as on 31.03.2022, out of which a sum of Rs. 7,28,73,514/- is invested in the LIC Group Gratuity Scheme.

#### 8. Capitalization of Work in Progress:

During the year Rs. 46,86,30,427/- was shown as Capital Work in Progress towards the expenditure incurred for setting up of Centre of Excellence (COEs) in FDDI's Branches at Banur, Punjab, Jodhpur, Kolkata, Rohtak, Chennai & Hyderabad.

#### Excess/shortfall of Income over expenditure:

As an Organization's Policy, the Excess of Income over Expenditure of Rs 4,15,09,419/-has been transferred to Capital/Corpus Fund.

#### 10. Grants in AID:

During the current year FDDI received Grant to the tune of Rs. 1,15,48,34,760/- and earned income out of the grant of Rs. 1,92,54,585/-. The grant utilized/adjusted against depreciation on Assets purchased out of the Grant of Rs. 64,11,68,499/- and other recurring administrative expenditure of Rs. 70,06,72,206/-. The status of Grants as on 31.3.2022 including grant received during the year 2021-22 for COEs, HRD Missions, IDLS etc. and utilized are as under:

  - ii) The balance of sundry debtors, creditors, receivable, loans & advances & other liabilities whether in debit or in credit are subject to confirmation and reconciliation.

- iii) The Institute has appointed the firm of Chartered Accountants to conduct their Internal Audit regularly for all the branches and HO. We have made the books of accounts of all the branches as audited by the Internal Auditor.
- iv)) All the financial figures have been rounded off to the nearest rupee while completing the financial statements.
- vi) Previous year figures have been regrouped and rearranged wherever it was necessary.
- vii) Fixed Assets (related to project) of all branches are maintained at head office.
